### Instructions

There will be 3 parts to this project. You will interview one or more family members to learn about your family history, then put the information all together into a PowerPoint presentation.

Your project will consist of the following:

Below are some topics to include in your family history research, and some questions to help with the interview.

## Part 1 - Interview Family Member(s)

#### Life

- 1. Ask one or two family member(s) what life was like for them.
- Make a summary of their answers.
  (and take notes about information you can use for the family tree as well).

Questions to help guide you and to give you some ideas:

- What is your birthday?
- What year were you born?
- Where were you born?
- How many brothers and sisters do you have?
- Who lived with you growing up?
- Where did you live when you were my age?
- What kind of building did you live in?
- What chores did you have when you were my age?
- What is the happiest memory from your childhood?
- How did you get groceries?
- What were the stores like?
- When were stores open?
- What was transportation like? (bus, train, tram, trolley, subway, cars, etc.)
- What did you do after school every day? (for example: paper route, watch TV, etc.)
- What did you do after you finished high school? (family, work, travel, moved, etc.)
- What did you do for fun when you weren't in school?
- What were your toys like?

## School and Education

- 1. Pick one or two family members and ask them about what school was like for them.
- 2. Make a summary of your information (any pictures would also help, but are not necessary).

Questions to help guide you and to give you some ideas:

- Where did you go to school?
- What was school like?
- What kind of building was it?
- How big was the school?
- How many students were in your school?
- How big were the classes?
- How far was school?
- How did you get to school every day?
- How did you learn?
- What did you wear?
- How were you assessed (test, oral presentations, etc.)?

## Places / Locations

- 1. Provide some information about places in your family history.
- Use a map or pictures to show some information about your family.
  →If your family has never lived anywhere other than in the same place, that's OK! You can still include information and a map of that area.

Questions to help guide you and to give you some ideas:

- Where were some of your family members born?
- Is there a specific country or a specific city where people have lived?
- What are some important places in your family history?
- Why are they important? (i.e. vacation location, birth place/country, school/education, etc.)

### Dates/Times


- 1. Please use a timeline to list some important times or dates in your family history.
- 2. Label the timeline or chart with dates and events.
  - Use any pictures or drawings to show some important times.
  - What are some important events in your family's history?
  - Are there any important births, deaths or marriages?
  - Did anyone move or change countries?
  - What are some important memories?

## Part 2 – Create Family Tree

- 1. AFTER you interview you family member(s), try to make a family tree for 3 generations. (you, your parents, your grandparents)
- 2. Include names (you don't have to include last names).
- 3. Show how people are related.
- 4. Try to have at least 6 people on the family tree.
- 5. If you can, include some pictures.
- 6. What is some simple information about each person? (likes, interesting facts, job, etc.)

#### Tip:

- You can use a simple, online free family tree maker from: https://www.familyecho.com/
- Only enter information you wish to share in your presentation
- When you are finished, make sure the family tree is visible on your monitor/computer screen.
- On your keyboard you can press "prt sc" on the top row usually, which captures a picture of your computer screen and the family tree. (If you use a phone/tablet, you can take a screen shot by holding down the volume button and power button, but methods vary depending on your device.)
- The screen capture automatically puts it in your computer/phone/tablet memory.
- In PowerPoint, paste it as "Device Independent Bitmap" which is just a picture from memory.
  - Click on the "Home" tab
  - o Click on the down arrow, and select "Paste Special"
  - Click on "Device Independent Bitmap"
  - o Press OK



## **Part 3 - PowerPoint Presentation**

**Instructions:** Using the information from your interview and family tree, you will create a presentation to put all your data together. Your PowerPoint should be a minimum of 10 slides.
